

Communicating with Elected Officials

Tips on Contacting Your Elected Representatives

Federal: To call your senators and representatives, you may always call the U.S. Capitol Switchboard at (202) 224-3121 and ask for your senators' and/or representative's offices. See the next page for links to find more contact information and record it for future use.

State: To find your state senator or assembly member, visit findyourrep.legislature.ca.gov to search by address or zip code (right column) and record that information as well.

Remember that telephone calls are usually taken by a staff member, not the legislator. Ask to speak with the aide who handles the issue about which you wish to comment. After identifying yourself, tell the aide you would like to leave a brief message, such as: "Please tell Senator/Representative/Assembly Member (Name) that I support/oppose (Bill number)." You may also want to very briefly state reasons for your support or opposition to the bill, but this is not necessary. Generally, they will just want your name and ZIP code. Ask for your senators' or representative's position on the bill. You may also request a written response to your telephone call.

Writing Your Legislators

Phone calls are the most popular and expeditious forms of communication. Calling your legislator is easy. Further, high volumes of calls receive considerable attention. Generally, you only need to state your name, ZIP code and the position you would wish the legislator to take on a bill or issue. If you are unable to make calls, email and contact forms available through the legislator's website may also be used.

If you wish to write a letter, it is important to use a contact form on the legislator's website rather than mail it, particularly if you are addressing members of Congress. Letters from organizations on official letterhead get the most attention. Consider delivering personal letters directly to the legislator's district office – going with several others will make an even greater statement. If you write a letter, this list of helpful suggestions will improve the effectiveness of the communication. The same applies to online contact forms:

- 1. Your purpose for writing should be stated in the first paragraph of the letter. If your letter pertains to a specific piece of legislation, identify it accordingly, e.g., Federal: H.R., S.; State: AB SB .
- 2. Be courteous, to the point, and include key information, using examples to support your position.
- 3. Address only one issue in each letter; and, if possible, keep the letter to one page.
- 4. Ask for a response, including his/her view on the issue and how he/she intends to vote.
- 5. Thank the legislator for considering your views.
