Annual Meeting Election Information

This year's Annual Meeting will be held on Sunday, April 28, at 1pm in the Family Center (Gym). Church members will be emailed a digital link to vote for new Elder Board and Nominating Committee members, but you'll also have the chance to vote in person before the meeting starting on Monday, April 15. Pre-meeting voting will be available weekdays through Thursday, April 25, at the church office, and also at the meeting on April 28. Voting information is available at the church or online at efc.org/events.

Church Members are reminded that under the EFCC Constitution & Bylaws, two categories of membership have been established: "Active" and "Associate." Only those in the Active category are eligible to vote. The Board of Elders encourages all Active Members to vote Some in our church family, though attending for many years, have never become members. If you are in this category, your name will not appear on the membership list and you are not eligible to vote. Jon Borland (Rebekah)

MANAGING CONFLICT: How do you manage conflict and react to temporary "unpopularity" if your convictions drive you to take a stand that is in the minority?

SALVATION: My first real solid memory of submitting and giving my life to Jesus was in November of 1980. This was at a Wednesday night church program at EFCC. I had deep conviction that evening that I had not put Jesus on the throne of my life, and I was still trying to be in control. My heart burned all the way home that evening, as I confessed to my family what I had sensed and how I felt I had not completely surrendered my life to Christ. That night in my mom and dad's room they got down on their knees with me while I confessed my sin and told Jesus I wanted Him to be on the throne of my life and in

charge of everything. That night is my first memory of acknowledging Christ; fully believing in my heart and confessing with mouth that Jesus is Lord.

EFCC SERVICE: (1) Organize and facilitate a discipleship class every year called, The Spiritual Authority Cohort. (2) Serve on special projects for the High School Ministry and Missions Department. I helped to prepare for and lead the recent HSM Mexico House Build Trip. (3) Disciple a number of high schoolers, young adults, and adults from our EFCC community. (4) Organize and lead solitude retreats for men. (5) Help lead our Inner Healing Prayer Team.

GIFTING AS ELDER: I'm a shepherd - evangelist (Eph 4:11), an encourager of people. I'm passionate about discipleship and seeing His Kingdom come fully. I see God's potential. God uses me in discipling hearts, helping people come to faith, and building foundations for being and living as 'sent ones' (John 17:18). At times, I sense His heart strongly for situations or circumstances and it can manifest in faith, wisdom, and insight. I most strongly relate with the Bible character of Barnabas. This happens through advocacy, coming alongside, connecting, and equipping people for His Glory, Mission, and Kingdom.

MANAGING CONFLICT: How do you manage conflict and react to temporary "unpopularity" if your convictions drive you to take a stand that is in the minority?

I've helped leaders work together, who hold a number of different opinions. What's helped me stay calm and loving when in the minority is Christ's example and not finding my identity in being 'right' or 'wrong'. also currently on the Nominating Committee and volunteer as a greeter at the 9am service in the Chapel.


